PREFACE

This Ordinance prescribes rules and regulations governing the five-year integrated undergraduate law programmes — B.A.LL.B.— offered by T. S. Mishra Law School, T. S. Mishra University. The Ordinance supplements the University Act, Statutes and Regulations and any directives of the statutory regulatory bodies from time to time (including Bar Council of India, where applicable).

The purpose of this Ordinance is to ensure high quality legal education, promote clinical and experiential learning, and prepare graduates for legal practice, research, policy and allied careers.

Ordinance for Five Years Integrated B.A.LL.B. Programme

Duration: 5 years

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1. Program Objectives & Programme Learning Outcomes (PLOs)

Program Objectives (POs):

1. Develop sound knowledge of law, legal reasoning and justice delivery systems.
2. Equip students with legal research, drafting, advocacy and alternative dispute resolution skills.
3. Encourage interdisciplinary understanding (social sciences/business) and ethical professional conduct.
4. Foster capacity for lifelong learning, policy analysis, public interest litigation and access to justice.
5. Promote clinical exposure and experiential learning through moot courts, legal aid clinics, internships and internships with courts/tribunals/NGOs.

Programme Learning Outcomes (PLOs):

- PLO1: Demonstrate knowledge of core legal subjects and allied disciplines relevant to integrated degrees.
- PLO2: Apply legal reasoning, critical analysis and problem solving to factual scenarios.
- PLO3: Conduct doctrinal and socio-legal research; draft pleadings, contracts and legal opinions.
- PLO4: Communicate and argue effectively before courts/tribunals and in alternative dispute resolution fora.
- PLO5: Exhibit professional ethics, social responsibility and norms of legal practice.
- PLO6: Use technology and legal information tools for research, practice and client counselling.
- PLO7: Engage in community outreach, legal aid and clinical activities to promote access to justice.

2. Scope

This Ordinance applies to all candidates admitted to the five-year integrated B.A.LL.B. and programme at T. S. Mishra Law School and governs curriculum, assessment, promotion, degree award and related matters unless otherwise specified.

3. Admission Criteria

- 3.1 Age:** Candidate must have completed 17 years of age on or before 31st December of the year of admission.
- 3.2 Qualifying Examination:** Candidate must have passed 10+2 (or equivalent) from a recognized Board. Minimum qualifying marks shall be as notified by the University (general category — 45%; reserved categories — as per applicable reservation policy).
- 3.3 Selection:** Admission shall be made on merit determined by (i) University/State/National entrance test score (where required), and/or (ii) counselling and personal interview and/or (iii) as per University admission policy. Reserved category relaxations will follow statutory provisions.
- 3.4 Lateral Entry:** No lateral entry is permitted into five-year integrated programme except as permitted by the University/competent authority under exceptional regulations.

4. Duration of the Course

- 4.1 Normal duration:** Five (5) academic years, comprising ten (10) semesters.
- 4.2 Maximum period for completion:** Seven (07) years (i.e., 2 × normal duration) from the date of admission, subject to satisfaction of academic and disciplinary requirements.
- 4.3 Students who do not complete within maximum period** will have their admission terminated unless extension is permitted by the competent authority for cogent reasons.

5. Medium of Instruction

English shall be the medium of instruction, examination and record unless otherwise permitted by the University in exceptional circumstances.

6. Attendance

- 6.1** A student must secure minimum 75% attendance in theory classes and 80% attendance in practical/clinical components (moot court, clinical legal education, internships, practical workshops) in each paper/subject to be eligible to appear in the University examination of that semester. Separate attendance requirement applies to each course/clinical posting.
- 6.2** The Dean/Principal/Head of School may, on recommendation and for valid reasons (medical grounds/documented emergencies), condone shortfall in attendance in extraordinary circumstances; such condonation shall not be automatic.

7. Organization of the Programme

- 7.1** Each academic year shall normally have two semesters of approximately six months each.
- 7.2** The programme shall include lectures, seminars, tutorials, clinical placements, moot courts, internships, legal aid work, workshops, a research project/dissertation and other experiential components as per curriculum.
- 7.3** The curriculum will include core law subjects, interdisciplinary allied subjects (social sciences/business), elective papers, practical/clinical courses and compulsory non-university/skill enhancement courses.

8. Curriculum and Credit System

8.1 Credit definition:

1 Credit (Theory) = 1 hour of lecture per week per semester.

1 Credit (Tutorial / Seminar) = 1 hour per week per semester.

1 Credit (Practical/Clinic/Moot/Clinical Posting) = 2 hours per week per semester.

1 Credit (Legal Clinic / Internship / Field Work) = 3 hours of supervised clinical/field work per week per semester.

8.2 Minimum Credit Requirement: The minimum credits required for award of the degree shall be 244 credits for B.A.LL.B. programme, distributed across 10 semesters, including mandatory clinical and internship credits.

8.3 Distribution: The programme shall have a mix of compulsory core courses (substantive and procedural law), discipline specific electives, generic electives (in social sciences/business), skill/clinical courses, dissertation/research project and non-credit/non-university courses (language/communication/IT/ethics).

Clinical/Internship requirement: Minimum mandatory internship/clinical hours and credits as per University regulations and Bar Council of India norms must be completed before award of degree.

10. Examination / Assessment and Grading

10.1 Components of Evaluation:

Each Subject will be evaluated out of 100 marks. The Subjects will normally have the following components of evaluation:

10.2 Theory Subjects:

Internal Assessment (IA)	40 marks
End-Semester Examination (ESE)	60 marks

10.3 Practical Subjects including Moot Court, Legal Aid, Internships, Soft Skills (Computer Applications)

Internal Assessment (IA)	40 marks
End-Semester Examination (ESE)	60 marks

10.4 Schedule of Examination:

On Completion of each semester a university examination will be conducted. Theory examinations will be of 3 hours as per the university schedule followed by practical examination.

10.5 Supplementary Examination:

Supplementary Examination will be held along with forthcoming odd/even semester examination as applicable.

10.6 Internal Assessment:

It shall be based on evaluation of periodic tests assignments, clinical presentations, Viva, etc., regular periodic examinations should be conducted throughout the course. There will be a minimum of one (1) internal examinations in each semester.

11. Qualifying Standards

11.1 Minimum pass marks in each theory and practical (including IA) shall be 50% separately for theory and practical components for each subject/paper.

11.2 For non-university skill/enrichment courses, pass criteria will be as notified by the University (typically 40% where applicable).

11.3 For awarding honours or distinctions and classification, aggregate CGPA rules shall apply.

12. Promotional Rules

Promotion of Student:

the Student will be declared PASS if,

- He/she secures at least 40% marks in Continuous Internal Evaluation & End Semester Examination in a paper,
- If He/she secures 50% or more in the grand total (Continuous Internal Evaluation + End Semester Examination), he/she will be declared as pass.
- If He/she secures 50% or more in the grand total and less than 50% and above 40% in paper/papers he/she will be declared as pass.

- e) If he/she secures 40% marks in 3 papers (Continuous Internal Evaluation + End Semester Examination) and secures 50% or more marks in remaining papers and secures 50% marks in Grand total will be declared pass.

Carry Forward of Marks: In case of a student who does not fulfil criteria mentioned above and fails in the Continuous Internal Evaluation and End Semester Examination in maximum 3 papers, then:

- i. He/she shall be eligible to appear in the Back Paper of those respective papers:
- ii. If he/she secures less than 50% marks fail in grand total.
- iii. If he/she obtain less than 40% marks in a paper.
- iv. If he/she fail in 3 or less than 3 papers (less than 40% marks) he/she will have entitled to appear for back paper in failed paper.
- v. If he/she fail in 3 or less than 3 papers. He/she will be entitled back papers in less marks paper. If he/she secures equal marks in papers and failed in grand total, he/she is allowed to choose back paper in that respective paper/papers.
- vi. He/she shall be entitled for back paper/improvement paper with odd semester examination and even semester examination.
- vii. If he/she fails in more than 3 Papers, then he/she shall be entitled to appear in the Re-Examination.

Number of Attempt of Back Paper: -

He/she is entitled the maximum of 2 attempts in back paper/improvement.

- If he/she passed the back paper examination, he/she issued consolidated mark sheet of that semester.
- If he/she failed to clear back paper in 2 attempts he/she will have re-appear in all the paper of that semester.
- He/she shall have to appear and clear the back paper within 7 years, if he/she does not clear by the end of 3 academic years he/she shall not be permitted in next semester

Duration of Course: -

- Duration of BA LL. B. course is five years.
- Maximum time period to complete this course is 7 years.

Promotion to next semester: -

- Maximum of 6 back paper (3 back paper for each semester) will be permitted for promotion to next semester.

13. Grace Marks

A Student may be awarded Grace Marks up to a maximum of total **5 marks**, in a maximum of **3 papers** including theory papers, and/or aggregate marks in each semester provided he/she can be declared to have passed the semester by the award of these marks. If a student fails in more than 3 papers, he/she will not be promoted in next semester.

Re-examination of Continuous Internal Evaluation and End Semester Examination: -

(I). Re-examination for Continuous Internal Evaluation should be completed before

the commencement of Next Semester Theory Examination.

Example: A Student who is supposed to reappear for Internal Evaluation in the Semester-I paper will appear for the Re-examination before the commencement of the End Semester Examination of Semester II. Re-examination of Continuous Internal Evaluation will be based on a single examination having the same marks as the original assessment. A Student who is supposed to reappear can be in the form of a paper project/assignment problem/test etc. A Student will do the submission of the assigned work in the predefined period. Records should be maintained properly for all the re-examinations as well as Continuous Assessments.

(II). Re-examination of the End Semester Examination will be conducted as per the schedule planned by the University

Grading of Performance-

Letter Grade and Grade Point Allocation: In BA LL.B. Program based on the combined performance in all Assessments in a particular Semester as per the Curriculum/Syllabus the Student is awarded a letter grade. These letter grades not only indicate a qualitative Assessment of the learner's performance but also carry a quantitative (numeric) equivalent called the Grade Point. The Letter Grades and their Equivalent Grade Point.

For a learner who remains absent in any form of evaluation/examination, the letter grade allocated to him/her should be AB and the corresponding grade point is zero. He/she should reappear for the said evaluation/examination in due course. The papers will be adopted from other programs their grade will be decided as per the ordinance of the respective program.

Re-admission to the University:

A Student who fails will have to take admission in next academic year as an exempted student. He / She will be allowed for re-admission on payment of prescribed fees provided he/she satisfies one of the following conditions:

- A student is declared failed.
- A student did not appear in the semester examination/failed in above 3 papers or failed in total marks and/or he/she was granted permission not to appear in the examination on his/her own request.
- A student has been detained by the University and has also been permitted to the re-admission.

14. Declaration of Result

In an individual subject the minimum pass marks (including internal assessment) shall be 50% in theory and 50% in practical separately. The marks obtained in the University Examination and in the internal assessment of the subject shall be added to compute subject percentage.

15. Award of Division

15.1 First Division with Honours: CGPA equivalent to 75% and above, if a candidate passes all examinations in first attempt without grace.

15.2 First Division: CGPA equivalent to 60% and above, passing in first attempt.

15.3 Second Division: CGPA equivalent to 50% and above.
(Conversion table between CGPA and percentage will follow University rules.)

16. Award of Rank:

Ranks (First to Third) in the programme will be awarded to candidates securing the highest CGPAs in the final result, provided they have passed all examinations in the first attempt and complied with internship/clinical requirements.

17. Award of Degree:

The degree of B.A.LL.B. shall be awarded to students who satisfy all academic, internship and other requirements of the Ordinance as per the university rules.

18. Scrutiny and Re-evaluation

18.1 Students shall be permitted to apply for scrutiny and/or re-evaluation of answer scripts within the time frame prescribed by the University after declaration of results.

18.2 Scrutiny shall consist of:

- Verification of total marks,
- Checking whether all answers have been evaluated,
- Ensuring that marks are correctly transferred to the mark-sheet.
- It shall not involve reassessment of answers.

18.3 Re-evaluation shall mean re-assessment of an answer script by an examiner (other than the original), as per University regulations. Only theory papers are eligible.

18.4 Practical examinations, viva-voce, clinical/fieldwork evaluations, internships, internal assessments, and project/dissertation evaluations shall **not be eligible** for re-evaluation.

18.5 Students must apply individually using the prescribed form and payment of applicable fee.

18.6 Changes arising from scrutiny and re-evaluation, whether increase or decrease, shall stand as final and binding.

18.7 Late applications shall not be entertained under any circumstances.

19. Subsidiary Subjects

19.1 Subsidiary subjects consist of skill-based, communication, behavioural, ICT, life-skill, and other non-university examination courses notified by the School.

19.2 In each subsidiary subject, a student must obtain minimum **40% marks** to be declared passed.

19.3 Subsidiary subjects shall be assessed entirely through **internal assessment**, practical demonstrations, project submissions, or continuous evaluation.

19.4 Marks obtained in subsidiary subjects shall **not be added** to the overall semester total, SGPA/CGPA or ranking.

19.5 Completion of all subsidiary subjects is mandatory before award of the B.A.LL.B. degree.

19.6 No supplementary or external examination shall be conducted for subsidiary subjects. Students failing in a subsidiary subject must re-appear in the next internal assessment cycle as scheduled by the School.

20. Unfair Means

20.1 Any student found or suspected to be employing unfair means in an examination, internal test, project, assignment, practical, moot, internship logbook, or dissertation shall be subject to disciplinary action.

20.2 Unfair means include, but are not limited to:

- Possession of unauthorized materials or electronic devices,
- Impersonation, proxy attendance or substitution,
- Copying, communication, collaboration or assisting others,
- Plagiarism in assignments, dissertations or research work,
- Fabrication or falsification of data or documents,
- Violation of examination rules or instructions.

20.3 All cases shall be referred to the **Unfair Means Committee** constituted by the University.

20.4 The student shall be given an opportunity to present their case before the Committee in accordance with principles of natural justice.

20.5 Penalties may include one or more of the following:

- Award of zero marks in the concerned paper,
- Cancellation of that examination,

- Cancellation of entire semester result,
- Debarment from one or more subsequent examinations,
- Suspension from classes,
- Expulsion from the programme for grave offences.

20.6 Repeat offenders shall face enhanced penalties including permanent dismissal from the programme.

21. Cancellation of Admission

21.1 Admission of a student may be cancelled by the University at any stage of the programme if found:

- a) Not meeting eligibility criteria set by regulatory bodies or University rules;
- b) Having submitted forged, falsified, or misleading documents;
- c) Engaging in gross misconduct, indiscipline, criminal behaviour, or violation of University policies;
- d) Involved in serious academic malpractice, including repeated unfair means;
- e) Failing to maintain minimum required attendance as per academic regulations;
- f) Failing to meet the academic requirements within the maximum stipulated period;
- g) Remaining absent without authorization for prolonged duration as prescribed.

21.2 The decision for cancellation shall be taken by the competent authority based on the recommendation of the relevant committee and after giving the student an opportunity to be heard.

21.3 Upon cancellation of admission, the student shall forfeit all fees and claims except as allowed under University fee refund rules.

They will also organize/participate in legal awareness camps in rural or urban low-income communities, focusing on rights related to domestic violence, wage disputes, or prisoner rights. Activities include creating pamphlets, conducting street plays, and one-on-one counselling.

3. Client Interviewing & Drafting Exercises

Through simulated and real-client interactions, students will practice interviewing techniques to extract relevant facts while maintaining confidentiality. They will draft mock legal aid petitions (e.g., maintenance claims, RTI applications, or bail pleas) and receive feedback from supervising lawyers. Emphasis will be on plain-language drafting for clients with limited literacy.

4. Case File Management & Reporting

Students will maintain records of assigned legal aid cases, including correspondence, evidence collection, and follow-up actions. They will submit a structured internship report reflecting on challenges faced (e.g., lack of client cooperation, delays in legal processes) and lessons learned from fieldwork.

Each student enrolled in 35 years LL.B. integrated course shall undergo an internship for minimum 20 weeks during the entire course under NGO, court, commissions, legal regulatory authorities, legislatures and parliament, other legal functionaries, law firms, companies, local self-government and other such bodies as the university may stipulate.

The report by the student and the diary will be submitted for evaluation.

There is an Internship Data form where students fill in the details of where they are interning with complete address and phone numbers.

Customized Legal Reference /Diary are provided to the students on payment. They will maintain a day to day record of the work that they do at the place they are interning.

They have to submit their completed diary, certificate from the employer and also a report of their experience at work. After submission there is a Viva by concerned faculty.

They assess the student on the kind of work they have done during internship, presentation of the work they have done and also on the practical knowledge they have gained.

The Paper is marked out of 100 marks. The breakup of the marks is as follows:

Each student enrolled in 35 years LL.B. integrated course shall undergo an internship for minimum 20 weeks during the entire course under NGO, court, commissions, legal regulatory authorities, legislatures and parliament, other legal functionaries, law firms, companies, local self-government and other such bodies as the university may stipulate.

The report by the student and the diary will be submitted for evaluation.

There is an Internship Data form where students fill in the details of where they are interning with complete address and phone numbers.

Customized Legal Reference /Diary are provided to the students on payment. They will maintain a day to day record of the work that they do at the place they are interning.

They have to submit their completed diary, certificate from the employer and also a report of their experience at work. After submission there is a Viva by concerned faculty.

They assess the student on the kind of work they have done during internship, presentation of the work they have done and also on the practical knowledge they have gained.

They assess the student on the kind of work they have done during internship, presentation of the work they have done and also on the practical knowledge they have gained.

A Legal Topic related to the course will be deputed to the student. The student may also have an opportunity to explore the topic of its own. It enables the student to explore a topic in more depth than an assignment essay.

In order to make a good dissertation a student should have the following ability:

3. Decide how to undertake the research.
4. Analyze and write up the data critically.

A word limit for the Dissertation shall be between 100-125 pages with Font- 12 of Times New Roman, spacing 1.5, excluding table of content, table of cases, table of statutes, abbreviations, foot notes (Font-10), Bibliography, Appendix, etc.

The Cover page, Supervisor's Certificate, Student's Declaration and the manner of giving Acknowledgement shall be given as prescribed by the Centre for Post-Graduate Legal Education.

A dissertation should be a piece of small- scale research which can be completed, start to finish, in the amount of time allotted to the student.

A dissertation should be a sustained argument. This means that it should draw upon the results of students reading, thinking and information gathering in such a way that it could persuade readers to accept the student understanding of the topic.
